

Alabama Dogs

In Late March, disaster struck Alabama. A sequence of tornados devastated the state, dis-placing so many. Animal shelters in Alabama needed help caring for displaced pets. The APF was contacted by Best Friends Animal Society and asked to assist.

Four dogs made the long journey from Alabama to Elmsford, New York where they were met by our animal care staff. A much shorter 2.5 hour ride was all the dogs had left before making it safely to APF. They all enjoyed the ride and even sang along to Aladin's A Whole New World!

After arriving, all four dogs were evaluated by our vet staff. Two of the pups needed crucial treatment for kennel cough. Our staff worked hard to get them healthy and ready for adoption. The Alabama dogs all found loving homes quickly. Cumberland's adopters says he is the perfect dog, loves his personality and he is a great addition to the family.

Thank you to everyone at Best Friends and APF for making this transfer possible! It was an honor to team up with several local animal organizations to help bring these homeless pets to safety.

wasn't the best fit for him. Being back at the shelter caused him to have social anxiety and other behavioral concerns. Our staff worked with him to try and ease his anxiety but they knew a foster home would be the best way for Declin to adjust to home life.

Once in his foster home Declin thrived. The social anxiety he was experiencing at the shelter virtually disappeared. He enjoyed cuddling on the couch watching Animal Planet with his family and even tried sitting on his families laps while they tried to work from home.

> and give advice on how to help Declin succeed in his new home. The new family was happy to hear how Declin's interactions at home differed from the anxiety he experienced at the shelter and were so grateful for how caring his foster family had been.

Thanks to everyone at APF and our dedicated foster volunteers, Declin is doing

great in his new loving home.

Cat Pawsitive

"Developed by Jackson Galaxy and a team of animal behavior experts, The Jackson Galaxy Project's Cat Pawsitive is a mojo-enhancing, positive-reinforcement clicker training initiative that enriches day-to-day life for cats in shelters, builds new skills for cats as well as shelter staff and volunteers, promotes the human-cat bond, and helps improve adoptability. By utilizing positive, reward-based Cat Pawsitive training, a shelter volunteer or staff member can reduce the stresses that might keep a cat from connecting with an adopter." http://thejacksongalaxyproject.greatergood.org/about/cat-pawsitive/

APF staff and volunteers initially enrolled into Jackson Galaxy's Cat Pawsitive Program in 2018, with many new faces at APF, both staff and volunteers, it was time to polish up our skills. Luckily, Jackson Galaxy's Cat Pawsitive Pro Refresher course rolled out in late 2020, and we were happy to jump on board!

Staff and volunteers receive professional training about positive reinforcement, by learning how to train using techniques such as Capturing, Shaping, Luring and Targeting. We focus on the cats struggling to adjust to life in the shelter but we have worked with higher energy cats to keep their minds occupied this helps give them an outlet for their energy. During this process we work with cats in short 10 minute sessions twice a day and reward positive social interactions. Once the cats feel comfortable and confident, our staff starts teaching them tricks like sit, high five, follow, place and more.

Cats enrolled in this program become more confident, have less stress related illness and build more positive connections with people. This program has been an awesome experience for all, cats and humans alike!

We are excited to announce that staff have all passed the refresher program and will soon be receiving their diplomas! Congratulations to staff members: Abby, Jessica, Marisa, Debbie, Becca, Carlee, Emmie, Kaitlyn and volunteers Arylis, Lynne, Evelyn, Linda and Kate!

Together, we have helped 13 cats in the program, completing over 300 training sessions, and totaling over 2,250 minutes of training!
